1. Customer Service

Monthly Customer Request Management System (CRMS) Report

CRMS statistics for the month of August show 213 customer requests registered with 86 requests remaining open and 127 being closed during the month.

Three complaints were received for August:

1. A cemeteries client complained that they received no response to messages about ordering a new plaque and placing ashes at the cemetery.

Action: Customer contacted, and issue resolved.

2. A community member expressed dissatisfaction about Council's policies and procedures after receiving a letter directing them to bring their waste and recycle bins in from the kerb after each pick up service.

Action: Customer contacted to provide further explanation, and the Waste team will be working with Council's Communications Advisor to undertake further community engagement on kerbside waste management moving forward.

3. A cemeteries client complained that Council had not provided the service of completing an order for a plaque.

Action: Discussed with Customer and issue resolved.







Debtors






Payment of Rates


Rates and charges outstanding from June 2022 to August 2022 have reduced from \$0.85m to \$0.65m. The revenue and ratings team continue to undertake collection processes.

The first 2022-23 rates notice was issued on 1 September, with a total 9,083 notices being sent - 46% = 4,181 Notices Emailed and 54%= 4,902 Posted.






The number of property assessments accessing hardship arrangements continues to remain steady.




Property sales data

The number of Land Information Certificates (LICs) processed annually and year to date are shown below. LIC's are required to be provided by Council to property conveyancers to assist in calculating property settlement payments in relation to Council rates and charges outstanding against a property being bought/sold.

The volume of LIC's processed can provide an indicator of the buoyancy of the property market. Mansfield Shire saw a slowing of the property market in 2021-22 after a significant increase in 2020-21.





Financial Counselling

August contained some good news: The Financial Counselling program is assisting a 79 year old gentleman. Support has incorporated two home visits. Results to date include successful negotiation of three debt waivers totalling \$15,853.

Integrated Family Services

August saw Integrated Family Services work on 'demand management', as the service had been operating with no vacancies for several months. The service was able to close with three families, meaning that room has been opened for other families in need.

Staff in the service supported families as per usual, including support with childhood education, housing, accessing mental health services, court processes and family led decision making meetings with the Family Violence Child Safety Team among other things.

Health and Quality

Better Communities Network will recommence in September to reconnect Educational providers Departmental representatives, Health and allied health providers and non-government organisations.

Respond – Soup for Schools Project was completed with St Marys in Merrijig and Mansfield Kindergarten.

Application process for Jump Start Funding from Vic Health commenced to obtain funding for physical activity for toddlers.


Regional assessment team continues following the cessation of Home and Community Care. We are currently recruiting for the Community Connections Officer and will conduct interviews this week. We continue to support the Mansfield District Hospital Support@Home program.

10. Visitor Services

The Great Victorian Rail Trail (GVRT)

A decrease of 2,745 recorded on the count on the Mansfield end of the GVRT has been recorded in comparison to this time last year, when August 2021 recorded a count of more than 6,000 users for the month. Some factors that influence this drop in numbers include:

- Weather this is one of the wettest years that the trail has seen, with both increased rainfall (10mm) and an increase in the number of days of rain. The temperature was also 3 degrees lower, on average, this year compared to last year.
- The Bonnie Doon counter remained stable so it could simply be people are doing shorter trips in different sections of the trail and not coming all the way through to the Mansfield end.
- August 2021 was a lockdown month, with many people remote working and not able to travel interstate or overseas. This increased regional tourism and enhanced the flexibility of local riders. COVID restrictions have a positive correlation with bicycle sales.
- Other local activities may have an impact. This year, Mt Buller is open and it is a great snow season, so outdoor activities may be skewed to people wanting to take advantage of snow based activities now that this is an option again.



The Great ARTdoors update

- Artists are now working on their installations along the Rail Trail after a significant process
 for selection of artists and appropriate sites. A small Melbourne-based documentary film
 and video production company, Thirdrow Films (thirdrowfilms.com), will document the
 GVRT Art Installations project. This will promote the project and the GVRT as a tourism
 asset.
- Many cycling events end or begin at the trailhead of the GVRT, which is at the Mansfield Visitor Information Centre. Last year, the Friends of the GVRT applied for a grant for a water station at that site through Goulburn Valley Water but were unsuccessful. Using


funding from the Victorian Government's COVIDSafe Outdoor Activation Fund and from Goulburn Valley Water, Council has been able to secure and install a water fountain at this location, which also hosts a bike repair station and bike pump.

Mansfield Visitor Information Centre (VIC)

While the count on the Rail Trail is down, the walk-in visitation to the Visitor Information Centre and sales have increased significantly from this time last year.

When looking at our month-on-month enquiries, we can also see a steady increase in numbers since lockdown finished in August 2021. This peaked in April but remains high compared to last year.



This success can be attributed to the shift toward an experiential offering at the VIC, with the inclusion of the Aboriginal Art exhibitions, repair and refresh of interpretive signage on the poles, internal speakers creating a modern atmosphere using contemporary music and a general refresh of the look and content provided at the VIC. Council continues to strive to provide a positive experience for visitors to the centre.

Council has been working with Tourism North East on communicating with new migrant markets to promote experiences across the region directly with those cohorts, as well as being able to provide relevant information, such as ticketing and booking requirements, in appropriate and effective ways.

Visitor Survey

The Visitor Information staff have recommenced gathering information from visitors to the centre, looking at age ranges, origin of travel, reasons for travel and more. These figures have remained consistent throughout the survey's current lifespan.

35% of visitors were aged 60+

29% of visitors were aged 40 -60

44% were adult couples

76% of visitors were here for a holiday over one day

59% of visitors to the VIC were visiting Mansfield for their first time

Most popular things were in order -

- Rivers, lakes and water.
- Bushwalking & outdoors.
- Mount Buller.
- Attractions.

The most popular reasons for visiting the information centre were, in order:

- Maps and directions
- Operator information
- Road conditions and updates.

Events

August is traditionally very quiet for events in Mansfield. Community events are not in full swing yet, but Council was able to assist with the following events:

Maindample Plant Sale

Council received feedback after the last Maindample Plant Sale in 2020 around the traffic concerns for the highway. In previous years there has been no traffic management needed on the highway, only in the township.

With increased local traffic due to population growth, increased regional travel and higher visitation to Mt Buller, a Traffic Management Plan was put in place to ensure the continued safety of drivers and pedestrians around the Maindample Plant Sale.

The Plant Sale is a positive community initiative with significant funds raised for the Maindample CFA. Council supported the event by covering costs for traffic management, including the initial plan and signage, setting up and packing down on the day.

Organiser of the Maindample Plant Sale, Ros, sent this feedback to Council:

Seniors Week

Council's Community Health and Wellbeing team and Tourism and Events team are partnering to present a range of events for Seniors Week 2022. Council was successful in obtaining a grant from the Victorian Seniors Festival and, due to COVID restrictions last year, held over a previous grant, which means this year a full range of events are being held thanks to \$6,700 in funding from the Victorian Seniors Festival. This has enabled Council to cover the costs of most of the events and to subsidise others to make them affordable for all. Some events include:

- Light Bushwalking with Mansfield Bushwalks
- Seniors Pilates classes with Barefoot Pilates
- Seniors Yoga and mindfulness
- Oma movie screening with Rosehaven and Mansfield Armchair Cinema
- Mad Hatters Morning Tea with Friends of the library group
- Seniors Ball with Mansfield Golf Club

Other Projects

Outdoor Activation Funds

Council was able to deliver on many of the projects the community had prioritised in community engagement within budget, leaving funds for additional projects, including:

New power box near the Amphitheatre

- New Water Station on Great Valley Rail Trail
- Two new art murals in Mansfield
- New tap at Botanic Park near the main gate entrance
- Events trailer for transport and storage of umbrellas, marquees
- Purchase of torso sculpture, which has received positive community feedback.

Tourism North East

The Tourism & Events Officer has been working closely with TNE around the cycling space and future marketing plans and research projects into new markets and identifying potential spaces to attract these users to our region.

As a result of this the recent proposed marketing plan for Ride High Country was altered due to feedback around the offering from Mansfield. It will now include heavier coverage of the Rail Trail art project and the Highline event and further events on the Highline site.

We are also in discussions with Tourism North East around the possibility of being included in an Augmented Reality trial piece for the North East region, leveraging off our Outdoor Activation Funding to have our new murals come alive through Augmented Reality apps.

Business Support

Business support newsletters with information on funding and grant opportunities, health/ mental health support, training workshops, local event links and MDBA membership and initiative information were emailed to 453 local businesses through August.

The reported figures below are the averages.

August's higher Open rate and Click rate continue above the industry benchmark levels and are higher than achieved in July.

Business Contacts

Council's Economic Development Officer Business Support continues to visit, call and email local businesses. Most communications have been about funding and grant opportunities, training and support programs and other opportunities for local businesses offered through state, federal and

agency programs. Through August, 26 businesses were provided with direct support, with a total of 34 contacts to those businesses throughout the month.

Business Support

Council continues to support the Mansfield District Business Association in facilitating an offering of virtual and face to face business training, support and advice sessions for local business with Business Victoria in partnership with Monarch Institute.

Businesses have the flexibility to book training sessions online via the Business Matters Newsletters and this offers both online training sessions and the opportunity for face-to-face training utilising Mansfield Shire Council facilities to conduct booked sessions.

Better Approvals

Local businesses seeking assistance in progressing their offerings by varying, expanding or creating new entities continued through August.

- A beginning civil construction business looking for training and employee supports.
- Continuing to assist Kevington Hotel with potential accommodation changes and business expansion ideas in need of funding assistance.
- Goughs Bay Dairy Goats looking for a variety of funding propositions and employees and potential interest in sponsorship.

GOTAFE Mobile Campus

The Mobile Campus visited Mansfield during August. Each visit has resulted in increased visitors, with 54 visits this month. A significant proportion of these visitors were employers seeking advice on staff training opportunities through GoTafe.

Business Victoria – Small Business Bus

The Business Victoria – "Small Business Bus" - will be in Mansfield for 17 November and will be located within the Car Parking Area in Highett Street (South) between the Mansfield Hotel and the Courthouse.

Library

Refurbishment Update – August

- The Library refurbishment is due to begin on Monday 19 September. During September, the Library will close for 3 days (Tuesday 20, Tuesday 27 and Wednesday 28) to allow for exterior plumbing works, site establishment and the fitting of internal walls. The front wall of the Library including the entrance will be fenced off. Access to the Library will be through the back car park.
- The focus this month has been firming up final details of the design with the architects and working with the builders to minimize disruption to the Library service.
- A list of assets (shelving and furniture) no longer required has been compiled for disposal.

Bookmark Competition

The Library is running a Bookmark Competition for young artists based on this year's Book Week theme "Dreaming with eyes open...".

 1^{st} and 2^{nd} place winners will be selected in 3 age group categories: Ages 4-8, 9-12 & 13-17. The winning designs from each age group will have their design produced onto bookmarks which will be available for free in the library for the entire year. 1^{st} and 2^{nd} place winners in each category will also receive book vouchers from Ink Bookshop, worth \$50 and \$25 respectively. Prizes have been donated by Friends of Mansfield Library. Winners will be announced on the Mansfield Library Facebook page on 9 September.

This is a wonderful opportunity for children and young people to have their artwork produced and enjoyed by the wider community.

Storytime sessions

To celebrate Children's Book Week, Library staff ran storytime sessions in kindergartens, schools, at MASS and at the Library.

There were ten sessions in total, reaching approximately 200 children. These included:

- The prep class from Mansfield Steiner School
- Farmhouse 3 and 4 year old day care and kindergarten
- Mansfield 3 and 4 year old kindergarten
- Grade 3 at Mansfield Primary
- Mansfield Autism State-wide Service (MASS). This was the first year the Library had visited MASS.

These sessions provide the opportunity for Library staff to share our love of story, rhyme and song, and most importantly to share the 2022 Children's Book Week winning books.





High Country Library Network (HCLN)

The updated Local History Collection Development Policy has been approved. Library users from Mansfield, Benalla and Alpine Shires are now able to view items held in Wangaratta Library's North East Room (shared Local History Collection) at their own Library branch. A secure and environmentally safe suitcase has been purchased to transport items between the Shires.

Mansfield Library continues to prioritise our local history collection, seeking out and purchasing material for both our own collection and the North East Room, and conducting regular reviews and stocktakes of this section.

The HCLN Library Coordinators held our annual collections conference in August. This financial year, higher priority will be given to purchasing eResources and multiple copies of high demand physical items. We are working on providing book sellers more clearly defined guidelines for profile buying.

OF NOTE: Mansfield Library supports local business by spending our annual discretionary fund (\$6,000) primarily at Ink Bookshop.


